

A Mosaic of Voices, Cultures, and Resilience




Across Every Stage of Life

CIWA's impact spans generations, from early childhood to later adulthood.

In 2024–2025, most clients were women aged 26 to 60 building futures while balancing work, caregiving, and community life.

Unlocking Potential Through Education and Integration

Many of CIWA's clients arrive with strong **educational foundations** ready to contribute as professionals yet face barriers that prevent them from fully participating in Canada's workforce.

Over one-third (37%) of clients have university level education (Bachelor's or higher), reflecting a deep well of untapped potential that Canada cannot afford to overlook.



A Holistic Service Model

CIWA delivered 163 distinct services through six integrated program streams.

CIWA's integrated, comprehensive approach supports immigrant women in rebuilding their professional identities and thriving with dignity. In 2024–2025, we delivered 163 services across six coordinated program streams, guiding women from first contact to long-term integration. Our services spanned the full settlement journey, including assessment, language training, employment support, counselling, skill-building, family development, and civic engagement.

Supporting Mothers Supporting Futures

Access to childcare makes a big difference for immigrant mothers working to rebuild their lives. CIWA provided on-site care for 436 children, giving women the chance to fully take part in language classes, counselling, and training, knowing their children were safe and well cared for in a culturally supportive environment.

This essential service is part of CIWA's holistic approach, helping mothers move forward with confidence, stability, and peace of mind.

IMPACT THAT TRANSFORMS

POWERING ECONOMIC INDEPENDENCE

Immigrant women face many barriers to employment in Canada; language challenges, lack of recognition for foreign credentials, limited networks, and unfamiliar workplace norms. These obstacles often lead to underemployment and economic insecurity.

CIWA bridges these gaps with services that build skills, confidence, and connections. From job readiness training and industry certifications to career coaching and employer events, our programs prepare women not just for work, but for long-term success.

Financial literacy is also key. Many women arrive with little knowledge of Canada's financial systems. CIWA offers accessible education and one-on-one coaching in budgeting, taxes, and financial planning, enabling women to take control of their futures.

When immigrant women thrive economically, their families, communities, and the economy benefit. CIWA's work supports inclusive growth, reduces reliance on social systems, and helps close labour market gaps by connecting skilled women to meaningful careers.

Rejoice's Road to Confidence and Career

Rejoice arrived in Canada from Nigeria in September 2024 with a degree in Environmental Studies, professional banking experience, and the determination to build a successful career. Like many newcomers, she faced unexpected financial barriers and uncertainty in a new labour market.

Through CIWA's Pre-employment Skills Program, she participated in resume writing, interview preparation, financial literacy workshops, and networking events, gaining the confidence and tools to navigate the Canadian workplace. With CIWA's support, she also received the Ron Ghitter CM Scholarship Fund to pursue Canadian Security certification.

Today, Rejoice is employed as an Administrative Assistant at Prospect Human Services and credits CIWA as a key part of her journey.

BUILDING BRIDGES To belonging

Social integration is essential to the well-being, independence, and long-term success of immigrant women. Yet many newcomers face barriers such as limited language skills, social isolation, and a lack of culturally safe spaces where they feel seen, heard, and valued.

CIWA addresses these challenges through comprehensive language instruction, community-based programs, and peer-led networks that build confidence, foster relationships, and support full participation in society. By creating spaces where women connect with friends, neighbours, and mentors, CIWA reduces isolation and nurtures a strong sense of belonging.

From English classes and parenting groups to leadership training and community events, each connection strengthens a sense of belonging. When immigrant women are empowered and connected, they thrive, and so do their families and communities.

From Isolation to Independence

When Shahnaz Bibi arrived in Canada from Pakistan in 2015, she carried hope for her family's future, but faced daunting challenges. With only a Grade 8 education and no English, even daily life was difficult. She took on cleaning jobs to get by but struggled to navigate her new environment.

Her turning point came when a HIPPY home visitor introduced her to CIWA.

Through CIWA's holistic support, Shahnaz accessed language classes (LINC), settlement services, financial literacy, Calgary Housing assistance, and seasonal supports. Free childcare allowed her to attend classes, and the Matched Savings Program helped cover citizenship fees for her and her childrenmaking a longheld dream come true.

With persistence and guidance, Shahnaz became a Canadian citizen, secured employment, and built a stable future. She now works as a Level 2 Lead Teacher at Endless ABC Childcare Centre and is on track to complete her Level 3 certification by June 2025. She also passed her driving test, a milestone she once thought impossible, and now takes her family on road trips across Alberta.

Rebuilding Confidence and Connection in Later Life

At 79, Liangwen began a new chapter in Canada after immigrating from China through parent sponsorship. She had left behind a lifetime of familiarity and friendships, and soon found herself isolated, struggling with depression, and heavily reliant on her children.

Everything began to change when she was referred to CIWA's One-on-One Counselling Programme. With caring support, Liangwen was able to build healthier coping strategies, make new friends, and slowly reconnect with herself.

Her journey continued through Grandma's Kitchen and CIWA's intergenerational programs, where she found joy, community, and the power of shared stories.

Today, Liangwen volunteers as a lead chef and mentor for other immigrant seniors. Her story is one of strength and renewal, proof that it's never too late to contribute, grow, and live with purpose.

When Fatihat arrived in Canada at the end of 2023 as a single mother of two, she brought determination but also faced the harsh realities of starting over. With no job and limited resources, meeting her family's basic needs was a daily struggle.

Referred to CIWA, she accessed our settlement services and was a beneficiary of our Adopt A Family campaign. Through CIWA's seasonal partner, the Magic of Christmas, Fatihat received groceries and thoughtful gifts for her children, bringing warmth, joy and hope to their first holiday season in Canada.

STRENGTHENING FAMILY RESILIENCY

For many immigrant women, building a life in Canada means doing so while raising children, navigating unfamiliar systems, and managing stressors tied to cultural adjustment, isolation, and economic uncertainty. CIWA's Wellbeing, Resiliency and Family Services are well equipped to meet these complex challenges with compassion, culturally responsive support, and practical tools.

Through programs focused on parenting, safety, and family wellness, CIWA helps women strengthen their roles as caregivers and decision makers, creating more stable homes and stronger communities.

Clients gain tools in positive parenting, emotional regulation, conflict resolution, and child development, enabling them to support their families confidently and clearly. Programs also address critical issues such as family cohesion, caregiver capacity, and school readiness, equipping parents to foster safe, nurturing environments where children can thrive.

When supported, children perform better in school, parents feel more empowered, and communities become more inclusive, connected, and resilient.

CIWA's holistic approach ensures that immigrant families are not just surviving, but laying down strong roots for long-term wellbeing, social inclusion, and shared prosperity in Canada.

From Fear to Hope

When April arrived in Canada from Sierra Leone in 2024, she was hiding a painful truth, she was pregnant and too afraid to tell her parents. Living in their home and unfamiliar with Canada's healthcare system, she felt isolated and overwhelmed.

A referral from Alberta Health Services brought her to CIWA, where she joined the Family Resource Network and Home Visitation Program. There, she received counselling, parenting support, and baby essentials, all delivered with compassion.

With each visit, April's confidence grew. She learned to care for her baby, embraced her role as a mother, and no longer felt alone. Her relationship with her parents strengthened, and today she is planning to return to school with renewed hope for the future.

Rebuilding Confidence and Belonging

Krystel, a 19 year old newcomer from the Philippines, arrived in Canada in 2024 after 14 years apart from her mother. Their reunion brought joy, but adjusting to a new country, culture, and life without a support system was challenging.

Krystel found her turning point through CIWA's Youth Mentorship Program. With guidance from her mentor, she began to rebuild her confidence, connect with peers, and discover a renewed sense of belonging.

Since then, she has secured a summer job at the Calgary Stampede, been selected as a CIWA Youth Change Leader, and accepted into the University of Calgary.

DIGNITY IN ACTION

At CIWA, we have seen a sharp rise in the number of immigrant women seeking support for gender-based violence with a 71% increase between 2023 and 2025. Many face language, cultural, and systemic barriers that make it difficult to access help.

They Tried To Silence Me But I Survived

I didn't walk away. I ran. From bruises to courtrooms, from silence to survival, I fought not for justice, but simply to live and to stand on my own two feet in a world that tried to bring me to my knees.

I came to Canada with hope. I had built a life on my terms, educated, employed internationally, and full of dreams for love and respect. But what awaited me in my arranged marriage was not a partner. It was control, cruelty, and violence. That house was not a home, it was a battlefield.

The woman who once stood in courtrooms, worked in government think tanks, and graduated with the highest honours, now stood silent in a house that tried to erase her voice. I was emotionally starved, stripped of dignity. And when I still didn't break, he raised his hand against me.

I was isolated. Denied basic necessities. Broken down until even my voice felt like a threat. When I refused to give in, he hit me. He locked me in the bathroom so no one would hear my cries. He threatened to have my family killed back home.

But I couldn't live like that anymore. One day, I ran to the police. That moment changed everything.

What followed wasn't easy. I was left with nothing. No job, no income, no support. I did janitorial work to survive. I skipped meals. I walked instead of taking the bus just to save a few dollars. But I never let go of the one thing he couldn't take from me, my will to fight.

That's when I found CIWA.

They became my lifeline. When I couldn't speak my truth, their counsellors listened. They helped me process the pain, regain my confidence, and take the first steps toward healing. CIWA didn't just hear me; they saw me. They gave me space to grieve, to heal, and to begin again. They saw my potential. And then they did something extraordinary: they believed in my future.

With a scholarship from CIWA, I'm now working toward my NCA accreditation to practice law in Canada. That scholarship wasn't just financial help, it was a reminder that I still have purpose. That I still matter.

Today, I am rebuilding slowly and fiercely. I plan to become a solicitor or barrister, not just for myself, but for other women like me. Women who feel invisible, unheard, and afraid. I want to be for them what CIWA was for me: safety, hope, and strength
